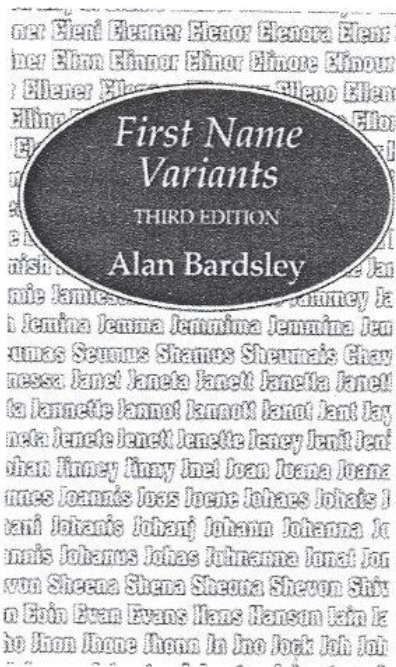


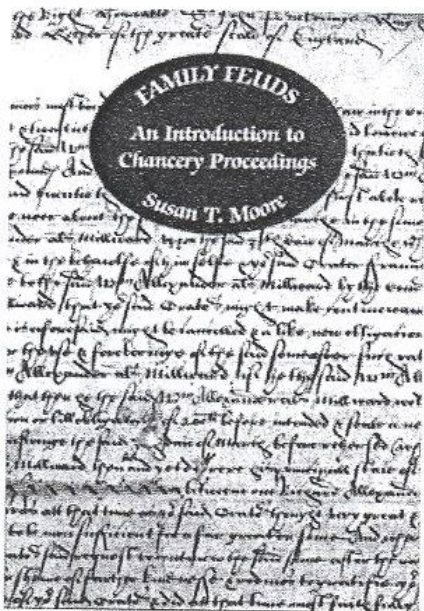
# RECENT BOOKS OF INTEREST

Your ancestors may have chosen to be known by any one of a variety of names (nicknames aside) and I must admit it surprised me to learn that Margaret could equally be Daisy, Gretchen, Rita, Mog, Pearl or Peggotty. Whilst we expect spellings of names to vary a bit, we do at least expect to recognise the original name in some way. This useful guide, as well as helping new parents to select a name for their offspring, will serve as an aid to historians who never knew that Seamus was a version of James or that Thirza was a female equivalent of Terence.

Here at last is someone, who not only understands the process, but is able to explain it in simple language that even I could understand. More than that, Susan Moore has such a passion for unravelling arguments that got out of hand centuries ago, that you want to go searching for yourself. She describes one series of cases as reading like a 17<sup>th</sup> century soap-opera. Good reference is made of indexes, including

those on-line. So, if you find, amongst the mysteries of your family history, it took twenty years to prove someone's will, this book will guide you through the search you may wish to make to discover why. Disputes over land and rights could involve wonderfully colourful statements, that bring to life the kind of people our ancestors were. Other people's arguments are always good entertainment and here is a corner of our recorded history where many a good tale can be found. This book comes strongly recommended.
